

## At the scene checklist

In the event of a motor vehicle accident, here is the information you need to collect.



The most important information you need to collect is the registration of the vehicle. Call 000 if anyone has been injured.

If you are too injured to gather details at the scene, someone else may have done so for you.	Injuries resulting in finar	ncial loss? Seek legal advice
These people could include:		3
1. Witnesses – If the accident happened near a shop/cafe/restaurant/someone's house, you may be able to speak with witnesses to gather the details you need or request CCTV footage.
